

So this is the LHM team. Everyone here works really hard to try and help all of you wonderful people! Thought you might like to know who we all are and what we do, in case you were suspicious that we were sitting around twiddling out thumbs or something...

Suzie Hutchinson AKA Chief Executive, Head Boffin, The Big Cheese



I'm Suzie, Mum to Olivia 19 and Freddy age 14, who many of you know. My husband is Rod. He's a surgeon but he does not do heart surgery. I'm too old to tell you my age but I have been working with children, and their families, who have heart problems for nearly 25 years and I've been a nurse for 30. Yes I know that makes me old but it also means that I know a lot about hearts especially ones that only have one pump. I have been working for Little Hearts Matter for nearly ten years and before that I helped the trustee parents set up the charity because I was the Cardiac Liaison sister at Birmingham Children's Hospital.

My job is to help anyone that is affected by only having half a heart. My title is Chief Executive which sounds posh but really that just means that I do a bit of everything.

I organise events, write information on the heart, and write about the challenges of living with a heart that doesn't work properly. Plus I'm always on the end of a phone when a family needs to chat.

I also work with Kevin to try and find the money that we need to pay for all of the things that we do. Sadly the Government don't give us any money we have to find it all ourselves.

Jon and I work together on planning the Youth project work, for example the activity weekend. He's the one with all the great ideas, I just input what I know about the heart and work out where we can find the money.

I also work with the Trustees to plan what the charity is going to do over the next year and I report to them by writing project plans, spreadsheets and strategies. Unlike you I didn't do computer studies at school so I have had to learn from scratch! Deb and Gwen are much better at it than I am.

The last really big job that I do is to tell people all about the charity and what we do but I also tell them about the things that worry our families. Part of that is to tell people in Government about congenital heart disease. It means lots of trips up and down to London and lots of meetings with people in suits but it is a very important part of Little Hearts Matters work.

When the new Zipper Zone website goes live I will be one of the people that you can come too if you need to ask any questions about your heart or your medical treatment. So if you want to ask me your health just pop a message on the Ask Us section.

Tina Walmsley AKA The glue that holds the whole office together!

What do I do? Well, it's my job to make sure that the office runs smoothly.

I am usually the first person to pick up the phone and if I can't help I make sure I find someone who can. Then there is all the day to day stuff like making sure there is enough stationery in the office, opening the post, making sure the bills are paid, donations are paid into the bank and that everyone who helps us gets a thank you letter.

Another one of my jobs is to sit in on some of the meetings and take notes to help everyone remember what they have promised to do. It's very busy in the office, there's always something going on.
