

Are you a righty or a lefty?

DID YOU KNOW? Little Hearts Matter used to be called Left Heart Matters.

That's because we only used to look after families who had a baby with a left sided heart condition. Now we look after anyone who has been affected by a 'Single Ventricle Heart Condition'. Single Ventricle Heart Condition means anyone with half a working heart, it doesn't matter if it's the left side or right side.

Do you know whether you are a 'righty' or a 'lefty'? Ask your parents exactly what your heart condition is called, and then use these lists to see whether you have a left sided condition (lefty) or a right sided condition (righty) or 'in the middle'.

Left Sided **Heart Conditions**

♦ Hypoplastic Left Heart

In The Middle

- Univentricular Hearts
- **Double Inlet Ventricle**
- **Double Outlet Ventricle**

Right Sided **Heart Conditions**



Your Youth Council in ACTION



Carys Allen and Sarah Haselgrove, both members of the LHM Youth Council, went to the House of Commons to tell MPs that schools don't understand heart conditions properly, and need to improve.

There were children from over 20 charities there, all with different health conditions, and they all had a chance to ask questions to some really important MPs - the people in parliament who make the decisions about how schools should look after kids with health conditions.

The children all sat down at the front and the adults had to sit at the back. This was an opportunity for young people to have their say. The MPs listened to all of the young people's questions, and had to come up with answers about how they would improve schools so that it is easier for children with health conditions. Sarah asked a brilliant question, telling the panel that too much pressure is being put on young people with heart conditions during their GCSEs. The panel said that the school shouldn't make you do so many, and that they should listen to every young person's individual needs.

Jon Sopel off of the TV was the chairman for the event. He presents the Politics Show on the BBC, and presents the news on BBC News 24 in the evenings. He was very friendly, and made sure that the MPs answered the children's questions properly, and didn't waffle on too long

This is another example of how young people are driving forward change to make sure that everyone with a heart condition has an easier time.

So, here is what I learnt from what you told me about the last Zipper Get Together:



There it is! If you have any more suggestions, then you can always email me at jon@lhm.org.uk and I will make sure that I listen to them, and use them to improve our events for you!


Our next confirmed event is going to be the Open Day in March 2010. Last March we had a quality time, so I hope that you will be able to come along to the next one and make loads of new friends.

Tricuspid Atresia



There are different ways to treat a baby with a right-sided condition. It all depends on how much blood is getting to your lungs and your body.



If there is too much blood Full variety flowing into your lungs, the surgeons put a band around the pulmonary artery, to make the blood flow slower. This is called 'banding'. Here is a picture of what a heart that has been banded might look like, can you

If there is not enough blood flowing into the lungs, the surgeons can put a small tube in, which redirects blood from the aorta (which takes blood to the body) to the pulmonary artery (which takes blood to the lungs). The tube is called a 'shunt'. Here is a picture of what a heart with a shunt might look like, can you see the 'shunt'?

TIME...we will have two pages on the FONTAN PROCEDURE. This is the operation that children with only one working ventricle have to redirect the blood flow.




